




Women's Ministry Kick-off Luncheon Sunday, March 4 12:30 p.m.

"...I am still not all I should be, but I am focusing all my energies on this one thing: Forgetting the past and looking forward to what lies ahead, I strain to reach the end of the race and receive the prize for which God, through Christ Jesus, is calling us up to heaven. I

hope all of you who are mature Christians will agree on these things...we must be sure to obey the truth we have learned already" (Philippians 3:13-16, NIV). Paul points out some great principles for living life God's way.

First, we need humbleness of heart. Humble people are very conscious of their own shortcomings and choose not to focus on other's shortcomings. Humbleness is a posture of dependence upon God with an honest evaluation of one's own strengths and weaknesses.

Second, we are to see the future with hopeful anticipation of what God will do. Paul says he looks forward to what lies ahead. He is a man of hope because he believes in

and is trusting God with his life and his plans. To write down your plans in pencil and give God the eraser is an act of trust and hope, believing that God has your best interest at heart and knows what He is doing.

Third, we are to live life with a view towards eternity. Seeing life through the lens of eternity enables us to weather the storms and stay on course. Our personal devotion to Jesus Christ as the One in charge Whom we follow opens us to God's presence and power in our lives.

Paul says that spiritual maturity possesses these perspectives. My prayer is that, by God's grace, each of us will mature in our walk with God, demonstrating these qualities each day.

Reflections by Pastor Rog

Dear Church Family,

Our life of discipleship with the Lord Jesus Christ is one of learning, implementing, and obeying His will for our lives. We never reach full spiritual growth this side of heaven but should be constantly aiming at what He desires us to be as we yield to the Holy Spirit. The apostle Paul understood this and his work with Christ reflected it. In Galatians 2:20, he penned:

"I am crucified with Christ; nevertheless I live; yet not I, but Christ lives in me; and the life which I now live in the flesh I live by the faith of the Son of God, Who loved me and gave Himself for me."

When we read verses like this, we may be tempted to think that what Paul penned here is but for a

few **select disciples** belonging to Jesus—certainly not meant for people like us. But it is.

A while back, I read an account of a young lady who took God's Word to heart as she ministered to those with leprosy in Calcutta, India. Her task was to care for little babies who had been stricken with this disease. A daunting task indeed! When asked by an observer if she was afraid of catching this dreaded disease, she replied, "Why should I be afraid? You see, I've already died. I've been crucified with Christ, so my life now is His. He is the One Who told me to care for these orphans. It is my joy and privilege to love these babies. This is what Christ would have me do." WOW!

In my many mission travels, it's been my privilege to be among and minister to people with leprosy. It



is a devastating disease, but they too need the Lord. I must admit, though, that my thoughts at that time were not bathed in Galatians 20:20 as her life was. This tells me that I did **then** and **still do** have a long way to go with having the spiritual reality of Galatians 2:20 stamped upon my life. Perhaps this is true for you as well. What are we to do?

In wrestling with this, it's been made clear to me that my eyes must be fixed on the Lord Jesus, the greatest SERVANT of all time.

Even though He is God in the flesh, He stooped to minister to sinners like me...like us (Matthew

Winter Camp 2018: God Wrecks Students

I'm writing this for Matt since we (13 students and leaders) just got back from our C4 High School Winter Camp. This was week 2 of three consecutive weeks of camp for him – Jr. High, High School, and College.

We combined with four other TransMin churches that we do Summer CLC with and created our own camp program. This meant that Matt led worship for the weekend and also spoke at one of the evening chapels. Because it snowed the day we left, we had many struggles getting home, finally arriving home 8 hours after our last chapel meeting. Right now, he is pretty exhausted so I thought I would fill you in on what God is doing.



Our theme for this retreat was "Broken Chains" as we looked at Galatians 5 and also looked at the life of Moses. What we learned was that the people of Israel were born into slavery and needed God through Moses to set them free. Yet despite the fact that God did many amazing miracles before them, they complained and wanted to go back to their bondage in slavery when life got tough. For us as Christians today, we were born in slavery to sin, but through Christ's death we are set free. Unfortunately, we sometimes want to go back to the life we had before, and we put on chains of our own making. This camp reminded us that we need to break those chains and live the life of freedom Christ offers us.

This was a huge time for all of us. God used this camp to wreck us spiritually and begin the process of making us new in Him—letting go of the things that hold us back.

TFB Academy "Inspiration-- Iruth Breathed Out"

When we think about inspiration, we often think of something along the lines of, "I feel so inspired..." But biblical inspiration is not about feeling. It is about history and reality.

With regard to the text of Scripture, inspiration means that through the influence of the Holy Spirit, the writings of Godselected persons (prophets) are also the trustworthy and authoritative Word of God. Inspiration has to do with this

influence, describing the process whereby the breath of God—his *spiration*—works through his prophets, making their written words his Word.

The family of terms translated "breath" in the New Testament, namely, *pneuma* and related terms, is used concerning the creation of the universe (Genesis 1:2) and of humanity (Genesis 6:17) in the Greek version of the Old Testament. God spoke, and the universe became. God breathed into the human's nostrils, and he became a living being. God breathed into the writings of the prophets, making those written words the very Word of God.

Because the Scripture, this written text, is breathed by God, it has value for our growth as persons in community in Christ. The prophets understood they were writing the words of God. They understood

inspiration and their part in it. They communicated this each time they used the phrase, "This is what Yahweh says."

Feeling moved, awed, or convicted in response to Scripture is good. It is important to feel the feelings rather than set them aside as useless or analyze them into non-existence. But feelings are not the foundation of faith. Truth is. And the inspired Word of God is our primary source of the truth about God. Feelings must not be the filter through which we select which biblical passages are authoritative and which we set aside. The entire Bible is authoritative.

"But, feelings are not, the foundation of faith. Truth is."

Biblical truth, gleaned from the entire Bible, is a sure foundation. It is always worth our intellectual, emotional, and behavioral engagement. Know the truth. Feel the feelings. Do God's work.







The History of Beacon Light Mission

In 1902, Captain Charles Farr approached the Executive Committee of the Los Angeles City Christian Endeavor Union and asked it to support a Sailor's Mission to be conducted by him in San Pedro, CA. After an investigation by the committee, it took over the work. Meetings were held aboard the "Warrior," an abandoned tugboat, moored on the east side of the San Pedro Bay. After about two years, a site was selected at 331 S. Beacon Street. A corporation was formed in

1905 and the mission was named "The Sailor's Rest Mission." In order to have a more central location, a building was rented at Fourth and Beacon Street. The success of the mission increased, and a bigger building was needed. Therefore, in 1916, a larger building at 430 S. Beacon Street was purchased. The purpose of the mission was to minister to the spiritual and physical needs of the men. Evangelistic services were held each night, and a meal was served to all who attended.

In 1924, the Community Chest offered to help finance the work the mission was doing, and the offer was accepted. The attendance dropped markedly during the war, but after the war the work increased so much that a larger building and more workers were needed. The adjoining building was purchased in 1945, and the two buildings were joined and remodeled to care for about 200 men. Also, the name was changed to "Beacon Light Mission," and it became a fully functioning shelter for men.

Beacon Street in San Pedro had the reputation of being the "roughest" street in the world. It was located in downtown San Pedro, in a decaying crime-ridden area filled with bars, liquor stores, prostitution, drugs and homeless men. In the middle of all this was the Beacon Light Mission, bringing God's light to those who found themselves in need in that darkness. Efforts by the City to clean up Beacon Street were not successful, and the City decided to just tear it all down. (If you were to look at map of San Pedro today, you would notice that there is no Beacon Street between 3rd Street and 6th Street.)

The Beacon Street Project of the Community Redevelopment Agency (C.R.A.) was formed to clear the area and in 1971, the Beacon Light Mission received its eviction notice. When a suitable relocation site could not be found in San Pedro, with the help of the C.R.A. and the United Way, a site in Wilmington was selected and construction began on our present site at 525 N. Broad Avenue. The mission opened its doors in Wilmington on March 11, 1972.

In December 1972, United Way ended its involvement with the mission, and the Beacon Light became privately supported. The Lord has continued to bless the Mission with financial support from churches, schools, businesses, individuals and a few industrial and professional foundations.

While the Wilmington facility was smaller, the conversions to Christ increased, and the ministry grew. In 1988, more space was needed for housing and feeding the needy, and so the chapel and dining room areas were enlarged to hold 80 people each and the dormitory facilities were expanded to provide temporary shelter for 20 men, plus a volunteer staff. The mission's goal was to meet the needs of the men—to rehabilitate them physically, spiritually, and vocationally, and to give them a new start for individual success. The Mission was open to men eighteen years of age and over, of any race, color, national origin or religion, and served everyone equally. Chapel services provided through local church groups that sent ministry teams monthly to the Beacon Light Mission were held nightly. Following the chapel service, meals were provided for everyone in attendance. However, if you were a woman, at the end of the evening, the best that could be offered was a blanket and a blessing, and you were back out on the street.

In 2005, research began on the feasibility of providing a shelter to homeless women. It was discovered that there were no facilities in the area that provided shelter for women who were alone on the street. In November 2007, without sufficient funding, the Board voted unanimously to step out in faith and move forward with the construction of a women's shelter, and the Doors of Hope Women's Shelter was conceived. A women's committee was established in 2008. Through their efforts the ministry needs were defined, the fundraising began, and the process of getting the City's approval was started. After overcoming a number of obstacles, the groundbreaking ceremony was held on July 10, 2010, and the facility, located next door to the Beacon Light Mission, was dedicated to the Lord's service on September 17, 2011. The dream of providing a shelter for homeless women became a reality as the 20 bed shelter for women opened its doors.
