Each Person Actively Expressing a Heart of Worship for Jesus Christ

In our church family we celebrate the death of Jesus Christ once a month through Communion—a ritual established by Jesus the night before His crucifixion and practiced by His followers ever since.

I have often wondered why Jesus never established a ritual to celebrate His resurrection. But the early church did establish a ritual of sorts to celebrate Jesus' resurrection by meeting for worship on Sundays, the day He rose from the dead. So in fact every week when we meet to worship the Triune God, we are in fact declaring and celebrating Easter – Resurrection Sunday.

There are numerous fantastic implications for the fact that Jesus conquered death. The one I want to mention is from the book of Romans where it says: "...Jesus Christ, Who died...Who was raised to life, is at the right hand of God...interceding for us" (8:34). Because Jesus rose from the dead, He is alive. Because He is alive, He can come to our aid. And the most important aid He can give is

stated in the book of Hebrews where it says: "Therefore He is able to save completely those who come to God through Him, because He always lives to intercede for them" (7:25).

The resurrection of Jesus means He has the power and authority to help us in this life and give us eternal life. Every Sunday we gather to celebrate this truth. In that way every Sunday is Resurrection Sunday.

Karen and I hope that this is true of **all** of us: that our weekly and even daily worship springs from the truth that Jesus is alive; that He conquered death and after paying for all our sins, He now sits at the right hand of God interceding for us and completely saving us.

Puzzle BROOCH


Make this keepsake to let your mom, grandma or aunt know that you wouldn't be complete without her!

Where in the world is the

> Churches can nurture city unity by joining forces...

In April, we identified Church as the people of God who know his story and expand his Kingdom. This month, we look at location. Where in the world is the Church?

The Church is in the world. When the world looks at the Church, what do they see? I suspect they see division. While we cannot change their perceptions, we can change our expression. We must help one another understand that, in the midst of our cultural, theological, and linguistic diversity, we are one in Christ. Healing is needed, but this need does not change our unity. We should develop international congregation-tocongregation linkages, partnering in prayer and in service, learning what unity feels like and expressing our unity before the world.

The Church is in a city. Each local church is in a particular city—a city with at least a few other local churches. Learning from Paul's letters, we might consider that each city has one church, despite the multiplicity of congregations. If this is the case, then inter-congregational linkages are critical to church health. Churches can nurture city unity by joining forces to take responsibility for some of the city's needs: feeding the homeless, welcoming newcomers, reading to children, or hugging sick babies.

The Church is in a neighborhood. Neighborhood is the most concrete and daily location. Speaking from experience, it is probably better to say, neighborhoods, for I, like many others, live in one neighborhood, gather as church in another, and work in yet another. We can look at this at least two ways: dilution or dispersion. In some cases, this multiplicity of neighborhoods dilutes the church, stretching connections beyond recognition. In other cases, the multiplicity disperses the church for action, expanding and multiplying connections.

If we think of the Sunday gathering as Church, the multiplicity of neighborhoods will almost certainly dilute our identity, making it thin and weak. If we think of the gathering persons as Church, then our gathering and dispersing maintains and strengthens our identity in Christ.

Muckenthaler Motor Car Festival in Fullerton May 15 (Sunday)


