

# From the Pastor's Heart



Living Outwardly Focused Lives in an Inwardly Focused World

Ray was a backslapping, idea-a-minute salesman who had come up with yet another scheme that he was absolutely certain would make a million dollars. The concept: a newfangled restaurant. The investment: just \$950 per franchise.

My dad was among those approached by this entrepreneur but he was skeptical. That night he chuckled about the venture when discussing it. "A hamburger stand! How does he expect to make any money selling hamburgers at such low prices?"

So a few days later my dad politely told Ray Kroc that he didn't think it would be prudent for him to invest in this questionable fast-food business that he was planning to call McDonald's.

Risk-taking can be a scary and dangerous endeavor. We have heard too many stories of people that have taken risks of one kind or another with painful or tragic results. For many of us, spiritual risk taking can also fill us with fear and anxiety. So we play it safe and stay within our spiritual comfort and control zones of life.

But spiritual risk-takers don't focus on the risks, but rather on God's vision, God's heart, and God's goals. Sure, they consider the potential struggles, failures and pain, but they are willing to risk it because they believe God's mission is more important than their comfort or their personal success.

Our theme for 2012, "Living Outwardly Focused Lives in an Inwardly Focused World" is probably one of the highest spiritual risks we can take. The risk of rejection from others and failure in our efforts is very real.

But I am convinced that for the sake of God's Kingdom and His cause, we need to become risk takers—to be willing to hear His voice and follow His lead to places outside our comfort and control zones.

My prayer for each of us is that we desire to honor God by being used of Him in lifechanging ways, and that we will overcome our tendency to stay comfortable and safe.





Answers: "Bear with each other and forgive one another if any of you." has a grievance against someone. Forgive as the Lord forgave you."



Try this twist on musical chairs.

#### What you need:

- 28 large index cards
- Black marker
- Two teams of people
- Radio or CD player

### What you do:

- 1. On index cards, write out *forgiveness*, one letter per card. Make two sets (two F's, two O's, etc.).
- 2. Mix up the cards and form them face up in a circle on the floor. (You'll have six blanks mixed in.)
- 3. Have teams mix themselves up and stand in a circle around the cards. Ask an extra person to turn the music on and off.
- 4. As the music plays, teams walk around the circle.When the music stops, players each pick up the card nearest them.
- 5. Team members take their cards to a designated area and try to spell forgiveness. Any double letters or blanks go back to the "music person," who reorganizes remaining cards, spacing them evenly into a fresh circle.
- 6. Play continues until one team spells *forgiveness*.

Hearing God in Chunk Reading by Laura Springer, M.Div., Th.M. http://www.facebook.com/ pages/TFB-Sanctify-Academy/ 166588986702549 Let's start with an important assumption: the Bible is the Word of God. We start here because though we agree with this statement, we too often do not live as if it were true. Mind you, I count myself fully in the "we." It is too easy to read the Bible--or, as is too often the case, not read it--for our own purposes. Since the Bible is the Word of God, we must read it as if we were standing before God, who loves us more than we know and is holier than we can imagine. As we stand before God in our reading of his Word, we stand as whole persons of intellect, emotion, and will. We bring all these to bear as we seek to hear

#### and understand his voice.

This month, we will look a bit more deeply into chunk reading. A "chunk" is loosely defined as at least whole chapters, better as whole books, and best as whole sections of Scripture. (One way to make this part of an already busy schedule is listening to an audio Bible.) Chunk reading has both head and heart components.

#### Head-Chunk Reading:

In head-chunk reading, we seek to understand the big picture. Intellect is the key tool. This means dredging up some of those skills learned in English and History class and applying them to whole books and large chunks of books. It means answering who, what, when, where, why, and how questions. Who wrote this book? What is the author's main idea? When was it written? Where did the original readers live? How does the author go about making his point?

#### Heart-Chunk Reading

In heart-chunk reading, we seek to enter the story, exploring what biblical persons may have felt and experienced as they lived life with God. Imagination is the key tool. This type of reading is best used after one has a good grasp of head-chunk reading, since the study in that type of reading provides details for the imagination. Here we enter the story and ask what the participants may have been feeling and thinking. In heart-chunk reading, we also listen inside our own hearts for the voice of the Spirit who dwells in our souls, fully expecting him to illuminate this Word of God, shining its light on our hearts and uncovering what must be uncovered.

Next month, we will look at Portion Reading.

BWERA, Uganda, January 17 (CDN) — A 15-year-old Christian girl in western Uganda who lost the use of her legs after her father locked her in a room for six months because she trusted Christ for salvation and left Islam, has begun to take tentative steps.



NEW DELHI, January 13 (CDN) — Attacks on Christians accelerated over the Christmas and New Year's holidays in the south Indian state of Karnataka, which was identified as the most unsafe place for the religious minority for the third consecutive year in 2011. With 49 cases of violence and hostility against Christians in 2011, Karnataka remained the state with the highest incidence of persecution, according to the Evangelical Fellowship of India's annual report, "Battered and Bruised." On Sunday, November 13, 2011, during the Worship and Witness service, we joined with Christians around the world in prayer for THE PERSECUTED CHURCH. This special call to prayer was organized by OPEN DOORS MINISTRY so that our brothers and sisters in Christ who are suffering for their faith would <u>know</u> that we are ONE WITH THEM.

The Bible has a lot to say about persecution and, as we study God's Word, we discover our Heavenly Father's <u>compassion</u> for those who suffer for their faith in Christ. These dear people are in the midst of a difficult journey and we want them to understand that they are not alone. We are reminded of this truth in 1 Corinthians 12:26, 27:

"And if one member suffers, all the members suffer with it; or if one member is honored, all the members rejoice with it. Now you are the body of Christ, and members individually."

You might be interested to know that over 100 million Christians in almost half of the countries of the world are persecuted for their faith in Jesus. Though the numbers are stunning, they should not be surprising since our Lord warned His disciples that they would "be handed over to be persecuted and put to death, and hated by all nations because of Me" (Matthew 24:9).

Our persecuted brethren cry out for our prayers—not for comfort and escape—but for others to stand firm and testify with their suffering.

To help us in our prayer time for these who are suffering for their faith in Christ, we handed out <u>prayer</u> <u>bracelets</u> shaped like barbed wire and a <u>prayer sheet</u> which highlighted four countries where persecution is presently taking place. We hand out a <u>new</u> prayer sheet every Sunday night during the Worship and Witness Service. [We are out of the prayer bracelets and are trying to order more.]

As <u>you</u> spend time alone with the Lord, please remember <u>your family in Christ</u> who are experiencing deep <u>trial</u> and hardship because of their steadfast faith in Christ. If we were in their shoes, we certainly would want them praying for us.

We are so thankful that even though we may never see these brother and sisters of ours <u>face to face</u> this side of heaven, we most certainly are ONE WITH THEM through faith in the Lord Jesus Christ. <u>Prayer</u> brings us together and our Lord most certainly will minister to their needs on our behalf. Thank you for praying!
