Women's Ministries presents a Progressive Dinner Saturday, June 7 ~ 5:00 p.m.



Reflections by Pastor Rog

Dear Church Family,

We live in a world filled with distractions and this can present us with problems if we let it...especially in our life of discipleship with the Lord Jesus. The nation of Israel dealt with many distractions especially as they were preparing to enter the Promised Land. This is why Joshua gave the Israelites this exhortation in Numbers 14:8-9:

"If the Lord is pleased with us. He will lead us into that land, a land flowing with milk and honey, and will give it to us. Only do not rebel against the Lord. And do not be afraid of the people of the land, because we will swallow them up.

Their protection is gone, but the Lord is with us. Do not be afraid of them" (NIV).

In Chapter 13, the people of Israel had just received an alarming report of the obstacles they would face as they entered the land, and they were in a state of panic. This is why Joshua told them they must stay focused on the Lord. Their God was absolutely trustworthy and He would do exactly as He had promised. How true!

You know, it is so easy for us (just like those people) to get caught up in our circumstances and lose sight of what God has for us. We, like them, must make sure our FOCUS stays on Him. But how can we do this?



Four important actions come to mind.

First, we must regularly spend time with God in His Word. So often we listen to the voices around us rather than communicating with Him. Our time in His Word will always give us the right perspective.

Second, we have to remember that He has a plan for our lives. No matter what the circumstances or distractions. He is still God and He is still in control. He is not frustrated by our circumstances.



We Get Mail


Dear Church Family,





From Lauran Bethell in the Netherlands combating human trafficking

Dear Friends at Torrance First Baptist,

This year marks the 29th since my commissioning with International Ministries. And in this penultimate year leading up to a significant "anniversary-that-ends in zero," I celebrate the "Then" and the "Now."

<u>THEN</u>: when I began meeting people in prostitution on the streets of Bangkok in 1986, NO ONE even used the term "human trafficking." <u>NOW</u>: "Human trafficking" is a term widely used. Spotlights of awareness are bringing it out of the darkness and baring its evil truth so that it can be defeated.

<u>THEN</u>: There were very few projects—Christian or otherwise—which were offering victims help, hope and healing. <u>NOW</u>: the number of those feeling called to ministry with victims in those dark places continues to grow daily! <u>THEN</u>: those if us working with the traumatized victims didn't know much about trauma's effect on them—or on us as care-givers. <u>NOW</u>: good experience-based research helps us to understand how to lead victims/survivors through their horrific stories to a place of growth, wisdom and compassion, and—also important—how to take care of the caregiver, who takes into him/herself the trauma of the other, and can experience burn-out and dysfunction as a result. We've come so far! And I'm so very blessed to have the privilege over these years of witnessing such a powerful movement of God's Spirit across this world, calling so many to offer God's Unconditional Love to victim (and victimizer) through relationship, rescue, reintegration, protection, prosecution and preventions...

...When I'm not organizing conferences, I have the privilege of serving the Boards of two distinctly different but equally cutting-edge organizations which are powerfully impacting the lives of victims and the vulnerable:

- I.) <u>Make Way Partners (MWP)</u> has as its motto: "With the Hope of the Gospel," to go 1) where women and children are at highest risk; 2) to the most 'dangerous' and 'remote places.' With extensive work in S. Sudan, they serve in places where children have to flea from bombs and rapist slave-traders. MWP stares fear in the face and confronts it with the provision of food, books, health-care, dorms—huge doses of Christ's Hope.
- II.) <u>Justice and Care</u>, a group that 1) courageously and aggressively investigates incidences of human trafficking; 2) secures the release of victims; 3) methodically prepares evidence towards prosecution of perpetrators and criminal networks; and 4) does whatever it takes to make sure that the best after-care is provided for the victims—for however long it is needed. They are the bearers of Christ's Care and Compassion for the most vulnerable in India.

I'm still travelling, speaking, awareness-raising, helping to develop new organizations, attending board meetings...But increasingly, I enjoy staying at home with my cat, Mischa, and hosting many wonderful people—often guiding them to discern God's Call to minister with the most vulnerable and exploited people on our earth. Come visit!

Thank you for your very faithful and generous support of the ministry God has given me through the years! You were on the journey with me **THEN** and continue with me **NOW**. I don't really have the words to express my thankfulness for the ways you have cared for me, and shared your resources and generosity. We've been on this journey together for many years. God continues to be faithful and I'm so thankful that I have the privilege of witnessing so many "new things" in the world of combating the evil of human trafficking. You have been a significant part of the journey.

Thank you for blessing my life—and for your continued prayers.



September 27-28


