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


Kids' Night Out


"Love & Chocolate"

You have heard the phrase, "Nothing is sure in life except death and taxes."

Reflections

Dear Church Family,

The longer I walk this life of discipleship with the Lord Jesus Christ, the more I become aware of His abundant mercy and grace. Mercy and grace are two of the great pillars of biblical teaching. Sadly, many people don't know of our wonderful God and His love for us. Both the Old and New Testaments proclaim the absolute greatness of our wonderful God. For example, see what the Old Testament prophet, Micah, says to us:

"Who is a God like You, Who pardons sin and forgives the transgressions of the remnant of His inheritance? You do not stay angry forever but delight to show mercy" (Micah 7:18, NIV).

Micah was a powerful witness for Almighty God. He prophesied God's Word to the Southern Kingdom of Judah sometime between 750 and 686 B.C. During this time, Judah experienced affluence and material prosperity but in the process became self-absorbed and spiritually complacent. Love for God waned and in the process, love for those less fortunate diminished as well. People were in great need, but those in power didn't care. The nation was losing contact with the Lord their God. This walking away from God would lead to Judah's destruction. Micah prophesied Judah's destruction and exile by the Babylonians (586 B.C.).



Beyond that, however, he saw a <u>future restoration</u> for a remnant of the people (539 B.C.). Those returning would be dealing with great heartaches and wondering if God would once again be merciful to them. He would, and Micah 7:18 proclaims this awesome truth. In verse 18, we find the word PARDON. The Hebrew word for pardon means to "lift up, or to relieve a burden." Let's face


Colossians Kids Kick-Off Wednesday February 4 6-8 p.m.



The world encourages people to look out for themselves and seek success, but in Micah 6:8, God tells us to live differently.


Directions: Put the conversation hearts in the correct order by writing the words on the lines below. Hint: Capitalization and quotation marks are included.

With Boldness & Fear by Laura Springer, M.Div., Th.M

Sometimes the Bible is shocking. The story of Abraham and the three strangers in <u>Genesis 18</u> is one of those times. When the three strangers met with Abraham, they told him Sodom and Gomorrah would be destroyed. Lot, Abraham's nephew, lived in Sodom. Abraham did not want Lot to die, so he haggled with God in an attempt to save the city. He argued that if there were 50, 45, or even 10 righteous living in the city, God should not destroy Sodom. Abraham

knew he was speaking with God, yet he argued his case boldly. Even more amazing: God haggled along with him. From our perspective, it might seem like Abraham acted with arrogant bravado. But this is not the case. The letter to the Hebrews commands this sort of confidence: "Let us then with confidence draw near the throne of grace, that we may receive mercy and find grace to help in time of need" (Heb 4:16). Confidence is expected.

Of course, we can take it too far. We dare not think we can barge into the throne room of God with no account of his sovereignty and divine power. "No one can see his face and live" (Exo 33:20). When Ezekiel saw God in the throne room vision, he fell on his face at the sight (Ezek 1:28). When Peter recognized Jesus in the boat, he realized his own sinfulness and begged Jesus to get away (Luke 5:8). When the apostle John saw Jesus in Revelation, he fell at Jesus' feet like a dead man (Rev 1:17). These three were afraid. Let us not diminish their fear by redefining it as respect. Respect was the response; fear was the emotion.

The God of love is also the mighty ruler and judge of the universe. Jesus came clothed in weakness to save and he comes again in strength to conquer evil once and for all (Rev 19). We are commanded to come to God boldly, but we come to the One who can squash us like a bug and make it as if we never were. It is his goodness, his promise, and his grace that allow us to come boldly and express our fear as godly respect rather than faithless terror.

Commandment #11

During the 17th century, an archbishop traveling through Scotland met theologian Samuel Rutherford but kept his identity secret. Rutherford invited the man to stay with him. When Mrs. Rutherford gathered the servants on Saturday to prepare for worship the next day, the guest joined in and was asked a basic question: "How many commandments are there?"

When the guest replied "11," Mrs. Rutherford said, "What a shame it is for you, a man with gray hairs, in a Christian country, not to know how many commandments there are!"

The next morning, Rev. Rutherford went out in the woods to pray and heard his guest doing likewise. When he discovered the archbishop's identity, Rutherford invited him to preach that morning.

The archbishop's topic? The 11th commandment, based on Jesus' words in John 13:34—"A new commandment I give to you, that you love one another" (ESV).
