

Dear Church Family,

We live in difficult times. The news brings report after report of man's inhumanity to man. This news saddens our hearts and if we're not careful, we can come to the conclusion that there is no <u>help</u> for us, but that's not true. No, we have our powerful, Almighty God on Whom to depend.

Since 2009, as part of my daily reading of God's Word, I've been "living" in the Psalms. The heart cry of David and others brings me face-to-face with the sorrows of life and God's gracious intervention to those who call out to Him. One such psalm is Psalm 20. (Please read this now). One thing we clearly need to understand is that the <u>war</u> we see raging today is <u>not</u> just political but spiritual. The Apostle Paul by Pastor Rog

speaks of this as he instructs the believers in Ephesus (Ephesians 6:10-13). <u>Satan seeks to disrupt</u> <u>our walk with the Lord Jesus</u> <u>Christ in any way possible</u>, and he seeks to rule the hearts and minds of mankind for he realizes his time is short. <u>Jesus is</u> <u>coming again</u>.

In the midst of all the sorrow and heartache we see taking place, we must realize that God <u>is</u> in control. He is not at a loss as to how to deal with these calamities. Our part is to keep our eyes on Him and entrust ourselves to His care. This leads us to Psalm 20.

Many commentators suggest that Psalm 20 is a *plea for God's protection* in a time of approaching trouble. In this



psalm, David is pleading with God's people to call out to Him so that He will... "answer you when you are in distress ...protect you ...send help from the sanctuary ...support you ...remember all your sacrifices ...accept your burnt offerings ...give you the desire of your heart ...and make all your plans succeed" (vv. 1-4). The context here, of course, pertains to how God's people came before Him at the Tabernacle, but the

- Greeters: The TFB Worship Committee can use new young volunteers to greet visitors on Sunday mornings.



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



"It's not about you." So begins Warren's *The Purpose Driven Life*, and so should our worship begin. While we certainly receive benefits from our participation in worship, it is not for us. Indeed, if our benefit is the focus of our worship, then we are the object of worship. Siblings, may it never be. While we recognize and plan space for the benefits, worship itself must remain a Christ-centered proclamation of our love for God.

Worship is an expression from who we are, declaring to God and before our community who God is and what he has done. It is individual and communal expression, so the mode of expression may differ across cultures and persons. This is a good thing. However, God's character and work determine its core content. Worship proclaims to God, in the presence of community, "You are worthy." These words of worship speak truth beyond me and you and us. Each time we proclaim his worth we join generations of God's people and myriads of angels who never cease to proclaim God's glory before his throne.

As you read the biblical words of worship below, consider these questions.

- What is the content of these biblical words of worship?
- How does our individual and communal worship vocabulary compare?
- How might we go about building our worship vocabulary as individuals and as a community?

Worthy are you to take the scroll and to open its seals, for you were slain, and by your blood you ransomed people for God from every tribe and language and people and nation, and you have made them a kingdom and priests to our God, and they shall reign on the earth.

Worthy is the Lamb who was slain, to receive power and wealth and wisdom and might and honor and glory and blessing!

To him who sits on the throne and to the Lamb be blessing and honor and glory and might forever and ever! *Amen*!

Revelation 5:8-14 ESV

Come, let us worship and bow down.

The following includes excerpts of a recent message that our missionary Chuck Corwin of Tyrannus Halls wrote to the SATHA Conclave in New Delhi. Currently, Chuck acts as Executive Secretary and communicates with all of the Halls. Chuck along with wife Elouise have published a book, <u>From the Halls of Tyrannus</u>, which is full of interesting stories from their 54 years of service.

"....You have chosen a difficult, unrewarding task—discipling university students. You have come to this conclave for encouragement and new ideas. But I caution you, Uchimura Kanzo, Japan's most famous Christian in the 19th century, worked with university students during Japan's enlightenment. There were few pastors and fewer churches. Uchimura founded the Non-church Movement in which converts disciple one another, often in university dorms. But even Uchimura had moments of doubt. He wrote, 'There is no one more irresponsible than a university student.'

Tokyo Tyrannus Hall is located right next to Waseda University's Athletic fields. We purposely chose that area to attract students; wrong. Hardly ever do we attract athletes. Waseda provides dormitories for them on the other side of the fields.

But go see those dorms: students in unwashed gear, leaning out windows, puffing on cigarettes, tossing out beer bottles, partying into the night. If nothing else, Tyrannus Hall must be a lighthouse where there is darkness. Today, when pastors visit the Tokyo Hall, some ask, 'Who cleans this place?' the answer is always the same, 'We do.' If Hall cleanliness falters, its light flickers. Frown at culture; if you don't like chasing dirt, you are in the wrong business.

A well-kept Hall gets unexpected rewards. In the early 1990's Tokyo Metropolitan drew up plans to widen the water channel running by our Hall. That meant demolishing the three-floored concrete structure. First words of their spokesman were, 'Don't worry. This student work will continue.' Tokyo Metropolitan kept its word. At their expense a new Hall was built in wood, like homes of the students, the land area was expanded and a Lydia Hall built. This would not have happened without courteous students living in clean rooms

Tim Medo visited Tokyo Tyrannus Hall in 1978 and returned to replicate it in Shillong [India]. Resources were thin. For finance, Tim began carting cattle to the plains. For leadership he groomed four graduate students and brought them on his trip to the U.S. in 1981.... [One of those students was Bonny Resu.] Since then, the presence of Bonny throughout South Asia has stimulated the growth of new halls; take for example the Cambodian Halls. This amazing story of street children finding make-shift quarters, then homes for their Halls, should be told at this conclave. We can all learn how to start Halls for the destitute.

Before beginning ministry among Shillong college students, Tim upped his theological knowledge at Bristol Bible College in England. Now he suggested that Bonny stay behind in America for a theological upgrade after the rest of the team returned to India, He would commute to Fuller from the nearest Tyrannus Halls board member's home. Ever wonder where the theological study-pillar came from?

Tim Medo was physically fit. He climbed Half Dome barefoot. Voyager Sunday School children sat transfixed as Tim made a gigantic leap into the air and across the room. THI Board member Andy Peck was one of those children. He has not forgotten that leap. Tim seemed to have no fear of the unknown. While staying with us, he took walks at night. Elouise offered a flashlight to find his way back. 'No thanks. At home we find our way by the stars.' Outreach into the unknown has become another pillar of Tyrannus Hall life"

application reaches out to us today who worship Him through faith in Jesus Christ. The point is: God heard the heart-felt cries of His people <u>then</u>, and He hears <u>our cries today</u>.

David knew that the first step to receiving what God could do was renouncing what he himself could do! In other words, when we are facing the testings and sorrows of life rather than trying to do our best to deal with these problems, we, at the very beginning, must entrust ourselves to His will and keeping. In David's day, some were trusting in the "weapons" of man as seen in v. 7.

Some trust in chariots and some in horses, but we trust in the Name of the Lord our God. We need to remember that *the Name of the Lord our God* refers to His character, reputation, and nature. David gained confidence as he meditated on the Lord, His God.


The same is true for us. Rather than worrying, becoming fearful and defeated, let's remember to Whom we belong. We belong to Almighty God, the Sovereign Lord of the universe. We may face great difficulties in the future, but we will never face them alone. He is right there with us.








Not in a partying 'MOOd'
