Sometimes it is hard to know exactly how best to stand for Jesus in a world where more and more seem to oppose Him and His followers. Even here in the U.S., we see more of this anti-Jesus, anti-Christian attitude out in the open. Each circumstance requires us to receive wisdom and discernment from the Holy Spirit to know how to respond. There is no same three-step response for them all. I recently read of one incident that occurred in the Iowa State Legislature that truly encourages me, and I hope it will encourage you too.

A Wiccan priestess was scheduled to give the opening prayer at the Thursday session of the Iowa State Legislature. So for the many Christians in this legislature, the question was how to respond. Do they walk out in protest when the Wiccan priestess starts to pray? Do they protest in advance trying to get her dropped from the schedule? Do they go public—go to the press with their complaint? Obvious there is no "right" answer, but I personally am impressed with what they decided and what was reported.

About half the law makers decided to hold their own opening prayer in a different room at the same time. They took a stand in a peaceful manner. Here is a part of the interview the Muscatine Journal conducted with the leader of the alternative prayer gathering.

"As a Christian, I have to stand in faith for her salvation and pray for her. Not pray against her, but pray against principalities and more so for her salvation," he told the Muscatine Journal. "I personally don't believe that Christians came here to stand against the Wiccan priestess. I believe that we came here united to stand for her salvation."

They took a stand with the right emphasis and focus, to see

this priestess saved. They understood where the battle really lies. That she was not the real enemy.

"For our struggle is not against flesh and blood, but against the rulers, against the authorities, against the powers of this dark world and against the spiritual forces of evil in the heavenly realms" (Ephesians 6:12, NIV).

Although this priestess, along with others, may decide to reject Jesus, or ignore Jesus or live life on their terms, they are not the real enemy. Our real enemy is Satan and the spiritual forces of evil. So the Wiccan priestess, along with every other unsaved person, desperately needs God's grace and truth to penetrate their minds and hearts. And they need us to earnestly pray for them and reach out to them.

May God help us see those hostile to Jesus, those indifferent to Jesus, and those trapped in a life of sin, deception and selfindulgence not as our enemies but as people needing rescuing by God's love and grace.





"We stand for individual rights."

"For he himself is our peace, who has made us both one and has broken down in his flesh the dividing wall of hostility by abolishing the law of commandments expressed in ordinances, that he might create in himself one new man in place of the two, so making peace, and might reconcile us both to God in one body through the cross, thereby killing the hostility" (Ephesians 2:14-16, ESV).

Puebla, México

Dear Friends,

This week we are taking a few days to celebrate a college graduation. Matias Perez graduated from the School of Psychology at the University of Michoacán last Saturday evening. His mother Pascuala and other family members arrived in Puebla on Thursday morning after an all-night bus trip from Chiapas, their home. After a rest in our home, we packed up the van and headed for Morelia, a five hour drive. By Friday we were rested and the celebration began with visits to the tourist sites of this beautiful colonial city.

What a story! Pascuala is a single mom who was determined to help her son get his education. She left their village in the mountains of Chiapas when Matias was five and found a job as a housekeeper in the larger town of Yajalon where she knew the

schools would be better. She worked seven long days a week at a wage of fifty dollars a month until Matias finished primary school...her only goal that he would have the chance for a better life. Looking for a better middle school she moved again for Matias' 7th grade year. In Ocosingo she supported herself and son cleaning homes, taking in laundry, anything she could do. Matias was bright, enthusiastic, and appreciative and usually near the top of his class.

Following high school he applied to the University of Michoacán where a special scholarship program was available for indigenous students. Passing his entrance exams and receiving the scholarship, he made the

twenty-hour bus trip to a strange new world. His scholarship provided room and board in a small house shared by 80 other students. The bunk beds were three high with less the 24 inches between them. Rules were tough for maintaining the scholarship, but Matias persevered and by the end of the first semester, there were less than 60 students and a little more room. He quickly joined the Baptist Church and became active in the youth program.

I admit we groaned when Matias shared his decision to major in Psychology. Over these four plus years, through many talks and watching him work with the church, we are becoming believers...that God is calling him to a ministry of counseling and working with young people. He has the gift, the character, the confidence and the love.

"So the next generation would know them, even the children yet to be born, and they in turn would tell their children."

Yes, David told Bailey about Jesus and so the story of God's love and redemption through faith in Christ has been passed on. Praise Him!
