

Dear Church Family,

His name was Toyohiko Kagawa. He was an author (150 books), a teacher, a poet a scientist, and . . . an evangelist.

During World War II, he was imprisoned for his pacifistic views. Because of this, he suffered a great deal of sorrow and anguish, but he never ceased to <u>love</u> and <u>serve</u> God. While in prison, he often repeated three meaningful requests in his prayers: "Father forgive;" "God, let me live to serve;" and "O God, make me like Christ."

From these 3 short requests, we can observe the spiritual depth of this dear man. He

desired his life to count for Christ even though he was hidden away in a dark prison cell, and he didn't treat his captors as enemies. Yes, in the midst of a very difficult situation, he took to heart the words of our Lord in Luke 23:34: "Father, forgive them, for they do not know what they are doing." And in Matthew 30:82, our Lord said, "He did not come to be served but to serve." How difficult this must have been for this dear man, but he persevered keeping his eyes on the Lord.

As I contemplate the life of this dear Christian, it's clear to me that his requests need to be



on my lips as well. It's so easy to get caught up in our own "little" world and forget that our lives really do impact others negatively or positively. Though this man was locked up in a lonely prison, he gave a very positive testimony for the Lord to his guards. I wonder how I would have reacted under the same circumstances?

According to the Talmud, at the re-dedication following the victory of the Maccabees over the Seleucid Empire, there was only enough consecrated olive oil to fuel the eternal flame in the Temple for one day. Miraculously, the oil burned for eight days, which was the length of time it took to press, prepare and consecrate fresh olive oil.

At our party here at TFB, we will learn the meaning of Hanukkah and celebrate with crafts and games that depict the Jewish culture of that day.






Juniors' Christmas Pajama Party December 9






SAMARITAN'S PURSE NEWS

TFB Academy "Looking Ahead to Now" by Laura Springer, M.Div., Th.M

The Church is the People of God, the New Humanity, the Fellowship of the Holy Ones, and the Body of Christ. Our identity is sure (Ephesians 2:11-22; 4:11-16; 1 Peter 1:13-21). But becoming Christ-like as persons in community takes time. Developing the skills and habits of unity and diversity takes time (Ephesians 2:17-22; 1 Corinthians 12:12-26).

We look ahead to Jesus, who is the author and perfecter of the life of trust (Hebrews 12:1-2). By looking ahead to Jesus, we are looking ahead to now. He keeps us on course and teaches us what real life looks like. He is the Lord, the Last Adam, the Holy One, and the Head. He is the one to whom we look in our

process of becoming.

What is this process? In Philippians 4, Paul gives his readers two commands as guidance: think and practice (vv. 8-9). Each command is plural, given to persons in community. Paul instructs his readers to think together on things that are true, honorable, just, pure, lovely, commendable, excellent, and worthy of praise. The Books of Scripture and Nature are replete with such things.

Paul also instructs them to practice what they have learned, received, heard, and seen in Paul. He called them to follow Jesus by

imitating fellow believers as they follow Jesus. This mutual imitation happens as we spend life together.

As a community, TFB has created spaces in which we can think and practice together. The three Sunday worship gatherings, Sunday School, weekday small groups, workdays, and outings offer spaces to think and practice as community. These opportunities are the starter set, the foundation for a daily life of thinking and practicing among fellow Christians.

"Finally, brothers, whatever is true, whatever is honorable, whatever is just, whatever is pure, whatever is lovely, whatever is commendable, if there is any excellence, if there is anything worthy of praise, think about these things. What you have learned and received and heard and seen in me—practice these things, and the God of peace will be with you" (Philippians 4:8-9, ESV).

We are excited to announce as a family that we have been accepted as missionaries with Go Ye Fellowship! We began the application process in May, sensing that it was time for a change. Special thanks to those who participated in writing recommendation letters and helping! We were privileged to meet with the board in July and then again this past Thursday where we were formally accepted. I was especially honored to have my dear friend and former boss John Lindsley, founder of Christian Surfing Federation, there as well. The years I have worked under John have been immeasurably valuable and I have immense respect for him as a disciple of Christ, lover of surfers, devoted family man and minister of the Gospel. It means so much to leave with his blessing and I am so thankful and honored that he gave me the opportunity to serve with CSF [Christian Surfers' Federation] for these past 5 years. He also was able to give the board a history lesson in surf ministry in the US, having been the founder along with Jerry Dow of the North American Christian Surfing Federation, the first surf ministry in the US!

The backstory to this is that this is the second time we applied to Go Ye. Back in 1999, after I had graduated from BIOLA, I was exploring missions agencies and met with Go Ye and actually finished an application process and was accepted. However, we took a U-turn that we didn't foresee and really felt that the timing wasn't right, and instead I applied to Fuller Seminary and spent the next 3 years there. It's funny how things can sometimes come full circle, and as we know, God's timing is perfect. It was especially neat to see some of the same office staff and board members some 16 years later! None of us are any younger, that's for sure. But still all serving our beloved Savior.

So what is next? For the time being, ministry-wise, everything will remain the same. Our primary focus will continue to be reaching surfers with the Gospel. I will be enrolling, along with Allison, in the Perspectives course as part of the requirements for Go Ye ministry so we are looking forward to that. I will continue to work locally with the Ventura group, reaching out to surfers with the Gospel using the same methods and means that I have been using for the past 12 years since starting out. We will continue our weekly Bible studies, camping trips, surf days, Surf and Share Saturday mornings, evangelism, worship, text

prayer chain, etc. However, we as a family would appreciate prayers as we seek over the next several months for direction in ministry, location, etc. Thank you!

Recently we had our first "South" campout... We were privileged to have a couple of unbelievers attend as well as 2 new believers and one other first-timer.... San Mateo campground is a really neat campground on the road to the Camp Pendleton Marine base.... Most everyone surfed for hours on Saturday then came together for grilled chicken and fish tacos. We all gathered at 7:30 Saturday night, and I shared a Gospel message with 3 points: Who God is, what sin and holiness are and finally, what salvation is. We especially spent some time on Romans 2:15 and how God has written the law on every heart so that we all have a similar standard of behavior that testifies against claims of "being good." I had a different message prepared until about 4 days or so before the campout and really felt that I needed to prepare and give this instead.

It is so good to see continued spiritual growth in the group, more passion for the Lord, for the Word of God, boldness to share the truth of the Gospel with others, God is good!


Christmas Card Exchange
