## Message from our Transitional Pastor:

Dear church family,

I am a transitional pastor, not an interim pastor. That is what the Lord has called me to be. And you are wondering right now ... what in the world is the difference and why should I really care. I'm glad you brought that up. Allow me to explain.

An interim pastor usually has a much shorter tenure. His job is simply to keep the boat afloat. He fills the pulpit on Sunday mornings and maintains things pretty much as they are.

Larger issues such as direction or vision or church health are not investigated. If there is an elephant in the room, that imposing animal is overlooked. The interim pastor simply keeps the boat afloat until the new captain is called. It is then the challenge of the new captain to attack all those important and often gnarly issues.

A transitional pastor is different. He doesn't just keep the boat afloat ... he gives it direction. He assembles a crew of teammates who together determine a new destination. A new course is charted. He makes necessary repairs to the ship in preparation for the long voyage. And yes, if there is an elephant on board, it is thrown overboard! If you think about it, all this would be a little daunting, if not downright scary, for a brand new permanent pastor to do. Having left his former job and relocated to a new city, a new permanent pastor is not likely to rock the boat (pardon all the metaphors!).

I'm just trying to do my part ... to prepare this church for a new and vibrant future. I have a part in this venture, the permanent pastor has a part, the leadership of this church has a part, and so does everyone else. Ultimately, as Paul puts it, it is God who causes growth:

"What, after all, is Apollos? And what is Paul? Only servants, through whom you came to believe as the Lord has assigned to each his task. I planted the seed, Apollos watered it, but God made it grow. So neither he who plants nor he who waters is anything, but only God, who makes things grow" (I Corinthians 3: 5-7).

I hope you care about the future of Torrance First Baptist and are willing to make the necessary adjustments so we can embark on a new and exciting voyage. The most important thing you can do right now is pray. Ultimately, it is God who will enable us to reach our new destination, so we must pray for His wisdom and direction and strength.

"For I know the plans I have for you," declares the LORD, "plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future. Then you will call upon me and come and pray to me, and I will listen to you. You will seek me and find me when you seek me with all your heart" (Jeremiah 29:11-14).

Now some of us might be tempted to say, "but you don't know what I've gone through. It's been tough!"





**Purpose**. Christians have a grand purpose that can be summed up in three phrases: know the story, be the people, expand the kingdom. Knowing the story begins with the content of Scripture and goes on to include our active participation in God's work. Being the people is living in relationship with Christ and fellow believers. Expanding the kingdom is becoming and making disciples.

**Process**. Generally speaking, we humans learn by increasing knowledge (investigating), putting that knowledge into practice (participating), and thinking through how we're doing so we can learn more (reflecting).

## Rainbow Acres A residential Christian Community Serving Adults with Developmental Disabilities

Meet Charlie! He arrived at Rainbow Acres about 17 months ago at the age of 26 and entered the Transition Program. When he arrived, he was a little anxious and very shy, spoke very little, and carried a Talking Picture Pad to help him communicate with others. Charlie comes from a very loving family where relationships are very close. Agape House became his daytime home between activities and events on the Ranch.

The guys in Agape House welcomed Charlie and were thrilled to have a new housemate. Dale and Austin quickly became his closest friends. They helped him get to Prayer Circle, Stepping Stones Crew with Austin, and then meet for lunch at the Palmer Center. In the afternoon, they would go together to the Recreation Room or some other activity on the Ranch. At the end of the day, Charlie would have dinner with the men at Agape, before his mother or father would pick him up to return to their family home.

All across the Ranch, Ranchers and employees began to see his anxiety and shyness being replaced with his contagious smile and a gleam of joy in his eyes. Soon, he began staying overnight at Agape House, gaining confidence and independence. Now he is comfortable staying at Agape any number of consecutive days.

Before coming to Rainbow Acres, Charlie's parents secured the services of a Speech Therapist to assist him in developing speaking skills. At Rainbow, he became involved in a Speech Therapy group with other Ranchers facilitated by Master's program students from Northern Arizona University's Speech Therapy department.

At Prayer Circle, Ranchers often sing, share joys and concerns, and make personal prayer requests for family, friends, their dog back home, and other concerns. IMAGINE EVERYONE'S SURPRISE when Charlie stood up and boldly spoke of his prayer requests! Everyone was so excited to hear Charlie speak, they cheered him on!

At first, Charlie's speech included just a few words. As he continued to make progress, his sentences became clearer and his words longer. He exudes new confidence every day and has begun calling everyone by their name. There is nothing more beautiful than hearing Charlie call you by name.

You share in Charlie's success with your love, compassion and generosity. You make a difference in the Ranchers' lives, as each one perseveres in reaching his/her highest potential and personal goals.

Thank you for your partnership in ministry. Long ago, there was a Rancher, Jules Andre, from FBC of Torrance. God bless!!

# Sad News from Minnesota

The Pillsbury doughboy died yesterday of a yeast infection and trauma complications from repeated pokes in the belly. He was 75.

Doughboy was buried in a lightly greased coffin.

Dozens of celebrities turned out to pay their respects, including Mrs. Butterworth, Hungry Jack, the California Raisins, Betty Crocker, the Hostess Twinkies, and Captain Crunch. The grave site was piled high with many flours.

Aunt Jemima delivered the eulogy and lovingly described Doughboy as a man who never knew how much he was kneaded.

Born and bread in Minnesota, Doughboy rose quickly in show business, but his later life was filled with turnovers. He was not considered a very smart cookie, wasting much of his dough on half-baked schemes.

Despite being a little flaky at times, he still was a crusty old man and was considered a positive roll model for millions.

Doughboy is survived by his wife Play Dough, three children, John Dough, Jane Dough, and Dosey Dough, plus they had one in the oven. He is also survived by his elderly father, Pop Tart.

The funeral was held at 3:50 for about 20 minutes.
