Turning Our Hearts To God

There is a very insightful and comforting truth expressed in the Old Testament book of Ecclesiastes. It says, *"There is nothing new under the sun."* The context is King Solomon searching for meaning in life apart from God. Since he is a king and has a great deal of power and resources at his disposal, he tries everything. He discovers that all those "new" things are not really new, just a twist on the same old stuff. All the things of this world bring only short-term pleasure but no deep satisfaction or meaning to life. They all take you to the same place — a place of dissatisfaction, frustration, and emptiness.

So why is this insight comforting to me? Because it helps me look past all that the world has to offer and find true meaning in God. If I am willing to learn from Solomon, it keeps me from going down some paths that lead to hopelessness and emptiness.

Jesus said that He came to give abundant life — life with true meaning, purpose, value, and significance. He also said the key to such an abundant life is a love relationship with God. True worship plays a key role in this love relationship. When we bow before God, when we praise Him, adore Him, thank Him, we are expressing our love for Him. And the more we actively express our love for Him, the more we will experience the abundant life He came to give.

We all know that life on this planet can be hard and painful. But as Paul said in 2 Corinthians 4:16, "We do not lose heart. Though outwardly we are wasting away, yet inwardly we are being renewed day by day." Worship renews our soul, our spirit, even when our bodies are struggling — even though our circumstances may be hard.

Is your spirit being renewed every day? If not, then worship God and allow Him to renew your spirit.

Turning Our Hearts To God



Dear Church Family,

Let's be honest with each other — life can be brutal at times. Sorrows touch our lives in many ways and at times when we are the least prepared to deal with them. Most of us have experienced this kind of sorrow. In reading through the Psalms, which I do on a regular basis, Psalm 102:1-2 has spoken to me in a significant way. Here, the psalmist pours out his heart before the Lord, saying:

"Hear my prayer, O Lord; let my cry for help come to You. Do not hide Your face from me when I am in distress..." (Psalm 102:1-2).

Now, we are not sure who the author of this psalm is, but we

certainly have no problem understanding his heart. He is experiencing great internal pain and he desires the Lord to <u>hear</u> him and <u>help</u> him. Every one of us has probably faced times of loneliness, despair or depression. Though some people may chide us for feelings such as these, they are a part of the fabric of life. What we <u>don't want</u> is for those emotional attitudes to become a <u>pattern</u> in our lives. *"But how can we change them?"* we ask.

I believe there are at least three things which could help us here.

<u>First</u>, we must understand that we can't deal with these



emotional attitudes in our own strength. The psalmist certainly understood this truth, for in his time of deep need, he cried out *"Hear my prayer, O Lord"* (vs. 1). This man realized that his need far surpassed his ability to deal with it. <u>We too must come to</u> this realization.

Second, we need to understand that though we do not comprehend what is happening to us, God does!





The holidays are just around the corner! We are planning for our holiday meals and give-aways to the needy. We will be doing the traditional meals for Thanksgiving and Christmas except that our **Thanksgiving meal** (on **November 1**) will not be turkey but rather ham and chicken as well as mashed potatoes and gravy, stove top stuffing, green bean casserole, cranberry sauce, yams, salads, rolls and desserts. We generally serve about 115 guests plus volunteers.



Our **Christmas meal** will be served on **December 6**. We want to give hygiene bags to our guests which include large sizes of shampoo/conditioner, deodorant, hand cream, toothpaste/toothbrush and socks for both men and women. 


TFB Kidz and JH Quest will not be meeting Thanksgiving Week (Wednesday, November 26)

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Samaritan's Purse Shoebox Ministry



INCLUDE \$7 DONATION PER BOX: Help cover shipping and other costs related to delivering your shoeboxes to children overseas by donating \$7 for each gift you prepare. **You can give online: www.samaritanspurse.org/operation-christmas-child/follow-your-box/ to discover the destination of your box.** Or, you can write a check to Samaritan's Purse (note "OCC" on the memo line) and place it in an envelope on top of the items inside your shoebox. If you are preparing multiple gifts, please make one combined donation. Note: Follow Your Box is only available through online giving.

What you need:

Acrylic paints



- Paint brush
- White cardstock (8" x 11")
- Baby wipes or wet paper towels
- 8" x 11" frame (available at dollar stores)
- Black permanent marker
- Bowls or paper plates

What you do:

- 1. Paint your palm, fingers, wrist and a portion of your arm with brown paint.
- 2. With the white cardstock placed vertically, press down your painted hand and arm. The print should resemble a tree trunk and branches.
- 3. Clean your hand and arm with baby wipes or wet paper towels.
- 4. Dip your fingertips into different-colored paints and press them onto the paper to make leaves. (It's autumn, so leaves can be falling!)
- 5. When paint is dry, write "thankful" down the trunk with permanent marker. Also write your name and the year in the corner.
- 6. Frame and display your decoration.

"...remain in him..." 1 John 2:27, 28

There are times when God takes away the consolations, the pleasures and comfort we feel in his presence. Other times—maybe most times—we take them away ourselves. We hurry too much. We fill our lives with things urgent and necessary. We surround ourselves with noise and tasks. We willfully neglect the rest commanded for our own good.

> The command to remain in him is not one that requires struggle. Rather, it is a command that requires we give up struggling. To remain is to trust that our life really is in him and to act accordingly. The results—the consolations are left in his hands. We simply place ourselves in his care.

From this place of remaining, we have the courage and boldness to stand and speak the truth so that the church and the world may hear. We are safe. We can stand and speak, knowing it is **impossible** for any ultimate harm to come to us.

Dear TFB,

We entered the home of a Syrian refugee family in Amman, Jordan on the holiday following Ramadan (the month of Islamic fasting) at the end of July. The lady cried as she explained that this was the first holiday she was to experience without her son as he was killed in the civil war in Syria. We visited, listened to her story, loved on her and prayed for her. We visited with others who actually showed us the bullet holes in their bodies. We found that *everyone* had a story. Many were crowded together in tight little apartments, trying to survive the high cost of living with very little money.

Our very first visit was to a hospital to see a family with a baby that was seriously ill. On the way, we received news that the baby had died. We drove the family home, went in the house, prayed for them and left. The baby died because of negligence and lack of attention due to an overloaded system. We felt so helpless.

The team we worked with carried on with faith, hope, love as well as fatigue and difficulties. That team is still there and working hard! As a family, along with Eileen's 16-yearold friend and my older sister, we were able to visit many Syrian refugee families and distribute aid and pray for these people in Jesus' name. We also loved on this long-term team. **Thank you, people of God at TFB, for making this**

possible through your generosity! Thank you for praying for us!

During our time in the Middle East, we learned of ISIS attacks and the war of Israel/Gaza. A plane was shot down over Ukraine. We always felt safe, but we were concerned with so many who were suffering all around us.

Thy Kingdom come, Thy will be done...

Have you ever pondered the fact that the God we worship is in the habit of bringing good out of evil? Do you know that in answer to our prayers (and you should be praying and asking for this) God is going to use the situation with ISIS to bring many, many Muslims to Himself as they see that their systems and beliefs are failing. Some will become atheists to be sure, but some also will find and turn to Jesus, the Prince of Peace.

Would you pray Luke 10:2 *and ask God to use us* to raise up workers for His Harvest in the Muslim world? It is a difficult place, which only makes it more worthy of God's glory. Do not despair, God is not surprised by the scary news headlines we read today. Jesus told us that all this was going to happen: "I have said these things to you, that in me you may have peace. In the world you will have tribulation. But take heart; I have overcome the world." Obey Jesus and take heart!

When we do this, we can relax knowing that He will do what is best for us and honoring to Him. This will result in us experiencing His peace (Philippians 4:6-7).

In your walk with the Lord Jesus, please remember that He is there for you no matter what you are facing. He is absolutely faithful; therefore, He can be trusted. Praise His Name.
