

Both Karen and I hope and pray that the year 2016 will be a year full of God's presence and grace in your life. Our hope is that during this new year your love and worship of God grows so much you can't help but see it and talk about it. We also pray that your service to our Lord brings Him great honor and fills your life with joy. Bottom line is that we want for all of us a year full of God.

Thinking of the new year and our church family, I want to share an experience I had when I was up in Portland this past November at my father's funeral. The Sunday after the funeral we attended a church my daughter attends. During the sermon the pastor quoted a verse from John 12. Jesus is telling His followers that He must die. He vaguely refers to His manner of death with these words: "And I, when I am lifted up from the earth, will draw all people to myself" (v. 32).

When I heard this verse quoted, the words just jumped out at me. My mind began to race with thoughts about how powerful this truth is. Although the context is about Jesus' death, my thoughts were more along the lines of the concept of lifting Jesus up and the impact that can have. It seemed like God was telling me that if my focus is on His son. Jesus, and if I and all His children at TFB "lift. Jesus up," then Jesus would draw people to Himself. Jesus said in Matthew 16 "I will build my church and the gates of Hades will not overcome it" (v. 18). So it is Jesus that brings people to

Himself—to salvation, to faith, to devotion of Him. Our privilege is to "lift Him up" before everyone—to honor Him, celebrate Him, adore Him, love Him, and obey Him. It is our privilege to pledge allegiance to Him and to serve Him. It is our privilege to live lives that invite and encourage people to come to Him. It is our privilege from the depths of our heart and soul to "lift Him up" and then watch Him draw people to Himself.

I must confess that I am taking this concept somewhat out of context from John 12 and stretching it a bit, BUT I believe the "lifting of Jesus up" is a no lose proposition. You and I spending 2016 elevating Jesus to prominence in our lives and our church will not only truly honor God, but I am convinced Jesus will respond by bringing us and others much closer to Him.

May 2016 be the year we experience this in a special way.




Homeless Survival Kits

In 1 Corinthians 12, Paul describes the Church as one body composed of many members. Each member is important and serves a purpose in helping the whole body function. Frank Spinney has been a fixture at the monthly ministry that TFB has at the Beacon Light Mission for longer than anyone can remember.


He has recognized that it is time to say goodbye and step out of that ministry. His last time to speak was on December 10.

Thank you, Frank, for your service to the Lord.



"God Is Self-Existent,
(Aseity)"

Someone asks, "When can you...?" or "How will you...?" We answer, "It depends." It's a small admission that something is not under our control. If we are honest with ourselves, we'd say this with nearly every breath, for, in the context of our little slice of the universe, let alone the entire universe, not much is actually under our control. Try as we might, none of us by force of will can make our lives just one hour longer (Matthew 6:27).

Everything in existence depends on something—well, almost everything. God is the one exception. He is not dependent. Rather, he is the One on whom all things depend. He is self-existent. God is not contingent; he does not depend on anything else for his existence.

In Psalm 115, the psalmist explains God's aseity, his self-existence, by comparing God to idols. Idols depend on humanity, but "Our God is in the heavens; he does all that he pleases" (Psalm 115:3, ESV). Idols can do nothing (Psalm 115:4-8). They cannot see us fall. They do not hear our cries. They cannot pick us up. God is ultimately able (Psalm 115:9-11). He always watches his people with care (Psalm 1:6). He hears our cries and helps (Psalm 34:17). He lifts us up when we fall (Psalm 146:8). Idols are utterly contingent and can do nothing. God is self-existent, and he is ever able to know and care.

God remembers. We are always on his mind, and he always remembers our need (Psalm 115:12). God will bless. He gives us what we need to flourish (Psalm 115:12-13). He remembers and blesses from a capacity that depends on nothing but himself, for he is the Creator, Owner, and Lord of everything (Psalm 115:16). His capacity is ultimate.

We respond by blessing him, living our lives toward his happiness (Psalm 115:18). We respond with praise, shouting his ultimacy in his presence and before all the peoples (Psalm 115:18).

Every last bit of food that I like must be banished 'till all the additional pounds have vanished.


I won't have a cookie - not even a lick. I'll want only to chew on a long celery stick.

We thank you for your faithfulness during this past year. We hope that the Lord has blessed you as you have been a part of sharing the good news through this ministry to Jew and Gentile alike. It is good to remember, as we see animosity towards Christians increasing and

our brothers and sisters in the Lord suffer persecution, that our God is here to comfort us, as we also comfort each other. "Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, the Father of mercies and God of all comfort, Who comforts us in all our tribulation that we may be able to comfort those who are in any trouble, with the comfort with which we ourselves are comforted by God" (1 Corinthians 1:3-4).

I get very excited each year as school begins because of all the wonderful ministry opportunities that life on campus brings. This year UCLA . . . [admitted] 5,760 freshmen. That means there are almost 6000 new students who have yet to discover our evangelism table for the first time!

Several days each week we set up a literature table featuring information about different religions and booklets about creation/evolution/intelligent design. I really enjoy our low key approach compared to all the busyness that's happening on the Bruin walk

I am always impressed by the students taking and reading the information, when they already have so much reading assigned in their classes. I am also impressed by the amount of time that they give us to talk. Last week, we had a 4th year physics major who really wanted to know the Gospel. He stayed for over an hour peppering me with questions, as other Christian students carried on separate conversations around the table. As I listened to him explain his belief that there is no right belief, I challenged him to explain how he knew this was true, and he explained that something was useful only as far as it is practical. He said that the only thing that mattered was if your beliefs help you today. I asked him how he knew this was the right way to live, and he said that it was a tradition in his culture for a long time. So, I said, "You are sure there is no right way?" He said, "Yes, all that matters is what is practical for right now." I said, "I thought you said there was no right way, but now you're saying that the practical way is the right way, so how do you know that is true?" He started laughing as he saw the point that he was essentially saying, "There is no right way but my way," just like he thinks religious people think. This is when the Spirit led me to share with him the difference between religious traditions and true biblical saving faith. I was able to go through the Gospel with him, focusing on the relationship that God wants to have with us, the lengths God went to establish that relationship, and the love that motivates the entire Gospel story. He was amazed that the whole of Christianity, which he had never understood before, didn't depend on a foundation of dogma, tradition, or even practicality, but on love. He thanked me several times for explaining this to him and left with some literature in hand. I pray for his salvation, and trust that God had a purpose in this young man's faith journey that led us together. I hope to see him again and continue sowing, watering, and watching God give the increase. ©

While in Israel this past summer with our Origins program I was picking up trash when a husband and wife stopped me and started asking me questions about who I was (an American volunteer), what I was doing (maintenance work), and how long (2 weeks). They assumed I was Yehudi (Jewish), and were shocked to find out that I wasn't. I told them I was an evangelical Christian. They didn't understand what that was, so I told them I was a Baptist. They didn't know what that was either, so I told them I was a Bible believer (a term used by the Israeli believers to explain why they are different), and they still didn't understand. So I told them I was a Talmudim B'Yeshua" (Disciple of Jesus). Boy, did they understand that! I saw the statement alone was challenging to them, and they were thinking about what it means to actually know and obey the teachings of Jesus. Their young men do the same with revered sages and rabbis down through their history, so they know it means a totally different life for someone to be so committed They wanted to know what motivates us to come and serve, so I was able to share about our love for the Jewish people that comes from our love for God and the teaching of His Word, the Bible. In the end, they wanted me to know and to share with the rest of our team and all of you back home who love the Jewish people, how grateful they are and how much they feel that they need us, and how they wish they could tell each one of us that they love us in return.

Laura and I are grateful to all of you who remember to pray for us as we try to balance family and ministry.


